#### Mathematics Focus - Primary

Morawa District High School has a whole school approach to teaching mathematics. This enables students to develop an increasingly sophisticated and refined mathematical understanding, fluency, logical reasoning, analytical thought and problem solving. These capabilities enable students to respond to familiar and unfamiliar situations by employing mathematical strategies to make informed decisions and solve problems efficiently.

Throughout the year, we will be sharing with parents some information about the mathematical strategies we explicitly teach students and how parents can help at home. Different strategies are taught at different stages of learning across the school which include:

- Counting strategies
- Addition and subtraction strategies
- Multiplication and division strategies
- Problem solving strategies

We use the Department of Education's First Steps in Mathematics as well as Paul Swan resources to teach mathematics at our school. Dr Paul Swan has a fantastic web page located at the following link: <a href="http://www.drpaulswan.com.au">http://www.drpaulswan.com.au</a>.





## Secondary Matters

Testing, Testing ...

Year 12 students completed Secondary Curriculum Standards Authority tests in all of their WACE subjects recently and are eagerly waiting their final results. The tests were marked by their teachers before being sent off to the authority to a marking team in Perth who mark papers from throughout the State. The team's results will be sent back to schools early in Term 3 to help ensure that marking standards are comparable.

#### Semester 1 Examinations

Students in Year 7 to 10 will sit their First Semester exams in English, Mathematics, Humanities and Social Sciences and Science over the next week. Parents can help their students prepare for the exams by making sure they have taken time to review their notes and practice their problem-solving skills. Year 11 students enrolled through SIDE in ATAR subjects have been sitting their exams this week. Other ATAR exams will be held from Tuesday.

#### **Public Speaking Competition**

All high school students will have the opportunity to complete in this year's public speaking competition. The students will have a practice speech in class before being selected for the finals to be held on June 19 between 10.30 and 12 noon. Trophies, medallions and certificates of commendation will be issued at the final!

#### **Upper School Work Packages**

Teachers are providing special work packages to Upper School students who have been falling behind in their work. Parents are encouraged to ensure their students complete the packages to ensure their success this semester. The packages are particularly important for Year 12 students who need to meet graduation requirements.

#### Chess

The school has taken delivery of a giant-sized chess set to be used in the undercover areas near the administration building. The slabs in the area were set up to cater for chess players but it had never been used. The new chess set was purchased after secondary students enthusiastically joined up to the school chess club which is run at lunchtime on Tuesday and Thursday. # Working Mathematically

Secondary students have been out in the school yard recently, using their mathematic skills to measure, plot, time and estimate such things as the height of trees and flagpoles, the speed of toy cars down mini ramps, the area of quadrangles and sporting facilities and the weight and volume of equipment, tanks and containers. They have constructed their own measuring devices and used a range of alternate methods to make their calculations.

The Year 11 ATAR class—which includes students from the WA College of Agriculture Morawa—completed their rigorous study program this week and were given the rare opportunity to use their Mathematics knowledge to solve a series of complex, hands-on puzzles as a reward for their hard work.

All Upper School students have been putting in special efforts to improve their mathematics grades recently and we are looking forward to the results of their approaching examinations.

































## Capital Works and Programs School Device Program

In 2019 NAPLAN testing will be conducted online in all schools. To assist schools to transition, the School Device Program is targeting funds to schools based on enrolment data. Morawa DHS will receive a total of \$10, 173.00. The funds will be used to purchase: 10 Notebook computers and a carrier 10 charging station.

#### **Universal Access toilet**

To complete the school upgrade to provide access to all students a new universal access toilet/bathroom was delivered and installed during the school holidays.

#### **Ceilings**

A routine maintenance inspection by the Department of Education identified that the ceilings in Rooms 19 & 20 needed to be replaced. Geraldton Building Services and Carpentry are on schedule to complete the work early next week.

#### **TCCCP Phone System**

The Department of Education has begun a roll out of a new wireless based phone system to all schools in Western Australia. Our school was migrated to the new system during the week. When we are advised that the new system is fully functional, the old phone lines and numbers will be phased out. The school will send out information to all parents and guardians with updated phone numbers

#### **Roller Blinds & Carpet Tiles**

#### **MATHS**



Students in Year 3/4 have been tantalising their tastebuds sorting cookies into the equivalent fraction jars. Students used this activity to activate their prior knowledge of equivalent fractions before leaping into locating fractions on number lines.



The Year 1/2 class are learning about how to tell the time to the quarter hour. We have been playing a fun game called roll and read the time. Students roll a dice and find the number down the side of the page. They then have to say what the time is on the clock. If they get it right, they put a counter on the clock.






We are growing our own wheat, barley, canola and lupin crops in K-PP. They were planted on the 2nd May, and had sprouted within 2 days.

## THE HISTORY OF MUSIC AT MORAWA DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

some early records of the development of music in Morawa concern the purchase of a piano in 1938 for \$50 from Thomsons Ltd. A list of names attached to a loan account probably enabled the purchase to take place.

In August of 1941 a five valve dual wave mantle model wireless was purchased. The School Band began when Mr. Dick Sasse the bandmaster of the Morawa Town Band and Mr. Sam Maher met in July 1962. To supply new recruits for the Town Band, Sam Maher suggested that Dick Sasse form a school band.

Mr. Ross Latham the headmaster was enthusiastic. Ross Latham contacted Mr. Edgar Nottage the Schools Superintendent of Music to get departmental approval.

soon after that, Mr. Nottages deputy Miss Frankel visited Morawa and discussed ways and means with Dick Sasse and Ross Latham. As a result of this meeting, Ken Davis, a trumpet player and teacher within the school was asked to organise the school band. He used eight very old brass instruments belonging to the Town Band. These were found lying idle in the Masonic Hall which was his classroom. Being an ex-Salvation Army player he commenced to teach a few children but was transferred the following year to be a bandmaster in Denmark.

Miss Frankel during this early time undertook to make Mr. Sam Mahers services available. He was at the time State School Brass Supervisor and great improvements occurred under his guidance. He was a very able player and an excellent teacher and a splendid bandmaster. It was regretful when through lack of teacher training his services were no longer required by the Education Department.

Miss Frankel tried to keep a flow of teachers who could teach brass coming to Morawa. Mr. Davis was replaced by Mr. Maughan who continued to perserve with old instruments. Also Dick Sasse assisted in the loan of instruments, music and music stands.

In about September 1962 the school band got going. Some of the early players were Bingo Osborne, Richard Sasse, Brenda Barnes, Les Young, Kevin Franklin, Graham Paech and others.

In 1963 quite a few more came into the band. Mr. Sasse recalls some of these students as being Rodney Madden, Kingsley Barnes, Michael Sasse, Michael Glendinning.

By 1964 the headmasters journal reported that the bands standard now enabled them perform at assemblies and sports days. The journal went on "I consider that the excellent tone now detectable in this school since June has resulted very largely from the influence of the school band."

It became evident that the instruments weren't adequate and at the beginning of 1965 a P.&.C. committee was formed to raise money and decide what instruments to buy.

The first band committee consisted of Dick Sasse (Chairman), Mr. Ward of the National Bank as Secretary, Mr. Reg Tubby and Mr. Bill North (Town Band) with Mr. Stan Glassford and Mr. John Broad of the P.&.C.

About \$\lambda 1000.00 was raised and the balance of \$\lambda 1500 came through a loan from The Morawa Shire Council. Twenty four instruments were purchased from Bossey and Hawkes in England. This was only about half the retail price in Australia. The instruments arrived in

Spring of 1965 and the original band committee having served its major purpose lapsed.

Mr. Maughan left and Mr. Pollard arrived to begin work in 1966. He writes that he had come at the request of the Education Department's superintendent of music Mr. E. Nottage. Bandmasters were difficult to find. "This was evident from the fact that I had never had a music lesson and although I had learnt to play a piano and quitar by ear I could not read music. Thus began my four years as bandmaster at this school."

Mr. Pollard mentions the band progressed quite well during the first two years and a large set of percussion instruments were purchased as well as more brass instruments.

Mr. Pollard wanted continuity and started a "beginners group". He also realized future progress of the band depended upon more organization and finance. A new P.&.C. committee was formed consisting of Ron Olden (President 1968), Pat Milloy (Secretary), Trevor Way (Cropping Programme), Dick Sasse (Town Bandmaster replaced in 1969 by Peter Jenkins), Charlie Ballard (Western Mining) and Max Tilley (President 1969).

Progress was rapid, from 21 students at the beginning of 1966 the members went to 43 in 1968.

Mr. Pollard was bandmaster for four years 1966 - 1969. He was succeeded by Mr. Les Peirce 1970, 71, 72; Mr. Bob Benton 1973, 74, 75; Mr. Roger Hey 1976, 77, 78, 79; Mr. Ric Kelly 1980 - 83 and the present bandmistress is Miss Wendy Green.

During 1971 the Morawa School Band gained first place in the A Section for Junior Bands. As well they made a tour of S.A. during the Christmas holiday period.

Many other awards have been won by the band and Headmasters Journals include letters of congratulations from Sir Charles Court and a visiting Japanese Ambassador.

Other developments in music have included Recorders. Records show 140 instruments were in use in grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 1st and 2nd year high school in 1962. The teachers had to learn themselves and then instruct students. Recorder work reached a peak in 1964 with 110 students playing base treble tenor and discant recorders.

Choir work appears to have occurred intermittently with no tradition being established.

The continuing positive influence of the School Band comes through as the school and community appreciate its music.

# Talking to kids makes them smart

The links between school achievement and parents' ability to talk with kids from a young age are now well established.

The language stimulation children receive when they talk with parents is one factor. But engagement in conversation with parents benefits kids in a far broader sense. In many ways it is through conversations that kids get a real sense of us as parents. It is through talking with kids that we impart some of our knowledge, ideas, wisdom and thoughts while also gaining access to a window into their worlds and the way they think.

In the current age of digital distraction, talking with children and young people can be a challenge. Busy schedules, homes designed for individual enjoyment rather than group living, a plethora of screens competing for attention and kids that clam up at the first sign of a chat are some of the conversation blockers parents must overcome.

You need to be cunning, proactive and inventive to get some chat going at home. These are some ideas that will help.

- 1. Turn screens off. Are you competing with televisions, computers and electronic games for your kids' attention? If so, take control of the screens to create some conversational space. Start with a screen-free day each week or screen-free hour each day if you have a home full of young hard-core screen junkies.
- 2. Turn screens on. If you can't beat them, join them. Some television programs provide great conversational fodder, particularly for older children and teens. Topics can range from "Who's going to win My Kitchen Rules?" or "What happens to the winners of My Kitchen Rules?" to "What is the point of My Kitchen Rules?"



**3. Have regular mealtimes.** The family that eats together talks together. Meals are great social occasions – more than just refueling stops. They provide terrific opportunities for families to get together and talk. It's no coincidence that families who enjoy and appreciate food generally enjoy close relationships as well. However, for this to work it's important that meals are screen free, so turn off the television and ban phones at the table.

- **4. Move more.** If sitting and chatting is not your child's thing then try to get some action happening. Boys, in particular, tend to talk more when they are playing, walking or involved in activity with an adult.
- **5. Talk with kids on their own turf.** Many children will open up in the privacy of their own bedroom where they tend to feel more relaxed and secure. If you have something important to discuss then choose a comfortable place and a time that promotes good conversation.
- **6. Try shoulder-to-shoulder parenting.** Travelling together in a car with the radio off, washing the dishes together or playing a game can all provide opportunities for talk. Paradoxically, many teenagers will talk more when they don't have to concentrate or make eye contact with the other person. That's why cars can be great conversation catalysts for parents.

Every family has their own way of getting the talk happening. Figure out what works for you and make sure it happens. The best communication in families happens when no one is working at it, however busy modern families need to work on their communication rather than leave it to chance.
