PUNCTUALITY AND ATTENDANCE

Congratulations to those students who received awards at the primary and secondary assemblies, and the whole school assembley today, for 100% attendance this term. It is important that all families send their children to school every day, as repeated absences without an explanation are not acceptable. A number of students are also coming into school after the morning bell which is disruptive for the teacher and the other students within the class. I seek parent support to ensure students are in class before the bell at 8.40am. This enables them to fully participate in all aspects of the teaching and learning programs. All students who are not at school by 10am are recorded as absent and parents or legal guardians will be sent a SMS message at 10am. We ask that all families have updated thir contact details so that we can send out the message to the right contact person. I ask that parents advise the school if your child is absent before 10am if possible explaining why your child

We are on track to improving our attendance rates this year and wish for all families to send their children to school every day, except if they are unwell. Holidays out of school time are not supported by the Department of Education Policy and I ask that families plan trips away during the holiday breaks.

If students miss one day of school every fortnight, by Year 9 they will have missed a whole year – every day counts. Please support our school to ensure your children meet this requirement. We cannot teach your child unless they are here and, YES, they do fall behind when they are absent!

NAPLAN ONLINE

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment of students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. This will be the first year MDHS students complete this online. All students are expected to participate in the testing unless they have applied for an exemption. Please contact the school for further information in regards to exemptions and withdrawals. Students will be assessed in language conventions (spelling and grammar and punctuation), writing, reading and numeracy. The tests are scheduled for Tuesday 14 May to Thursday 23 May. All schools across Australia must complete the tests on the same days. If your child is going to be absent on one of these days or if have any queries or concerns regarding your child's participation in the assessment, please contact the school. Catch up testing will occur over the 9 days. BEHAVIOUR MANAGEMENT & EXPECTATIONS

Our school motto is Endeavour & Achieve. We have high behaviour expectations and promote positive behaviour choices at all times, striving to achieve out school motto. The brochure ncluded in today's newsletter, outlines the process we use to manage student behaviour. We ask that parents be aware of the process and support our focus on promoting behaviour choices in and out of the classroom. Our expectations are Respect, Responsibility and Achievement and we teach these expectations to our students in the classroom and whole school level using these words. Dojo points [house points] are awarded to students when they display the expected behaviours which are also modelled at school assemblies.

- Be Respectful Follow all staff instructions promptly and politely, speak and act courteously and use good manners e.g. saying good morning and good afternoon, using please and thank you, taking turns to talk during discussions, support and help others, acknowledge the other's achievements, move promptly and quietly between classes, be an active listener, use respectful language, wait your turn and be patient with others, effective listening, actively listening to others, showing positive sportsmanship, allow others to complete their work, treat others with fairness, kindness and respect and how you would like to be treated, be considerate of other people and their space.
- Be Responsible Be neat, tidy and wear school uniform, be punctual and prepared, complete all set tasks to the best of your ability, care for your personal and class equipment, stay focused on your learning activities, play and eat in designated areas, walk on paved areas and verandahs, return sports equipment after use, wear hats outdoors, keep our school clean and always place rubbish in the bin, say no to bullying, following the rules of the game.

- **Strive for Achievement** -Follow our school expectations, attend school on time and regularly, strive to do your best Be an active participant, set and achieve personal and academic goals, work is neat and tidy, resolve conflicts positively, recognise and accept differences, model appropriate behavior, persevere when faced with challenges.

Please make time over the holiday period to reflect and talk with your child about how they are going at school, both in and out of the classroom. For those who have fulfilled their goals they set at the start of Term 1, it is time to set new ones before next term.

VIOLENCE IN SCHOOLS

We believe every child has the right to be safe at school. We provide learning environments that foster good behaviour and respect for your children and those around them.

Fortunately, most students attending public schools in Western Australia are able to learn in safe and supportive environments. At times, though, some students can be physically aggressive. This is never acceptable as it can cause psychological and physical harm to those involved, as well as disruption to teaching and learning.

The State Government has released a statement to address violence in schools. It sets out 10 actions to help school staff, families and communities work together on this complex issue. Programs and resources will be available for parents to support their children to maintain positive behaviour at school. A copy of the statement is available on the Department's website at education.wa.edu.au.

It is important to understand that these changes focus on students who have intentionally been physically aggressive towards others. Students with a disability who either cannot manage their behaviour or do not intend to harm others are not the target of this plan.

As parents, you also play a vital role. Your children benefit from you modelling and rewarding positive behaviour. I look forward to your ongoing support to keep our school a safe place for all.

MOBILE PHONES

Just a reminder to all parents and carers that mobile phones are not permitted at school, in classrooms or the playground due to privacy issues. They need to be turned off in school bags or handed in at the office each day, where they are stored for the duration of the day and handed back at the end of each day. Student's phones are confiscated if they are seen and returned at the end of the day.

HARMONY DAY / BULLYING NO WAY DAY

What a wonderful celebration we had with the celebration of diversity in our school on Wednesday Week 8 with students participating in a range of activities throughout the day and attending the Harmony Day assembly, where we celebrated the diversity of our school. Thank you to Miss Nadia Katona and all staff and students for a fabulous and rich day. During week 6 classes focused on Saying No to Bullying and Violence, with students engaged in a variety of activities to help them say no to bullying and give them strategies to deal with it if it does occur. We do not tolerate bullying at Morawa District High School. What is bullying? Bullying is the misuse of power to target an individual or group to intentially cause embarrassment, pain or discomfort. It can be:

Physical: (hitting, kicking, pinching, pushing, tripping and biting)

Verbal (put-downs, insulting language, name-calling, swearing, racist or sexist comments)

Cyber (text messages, email, websites, instant messaging)

Psychological (threats, gestures, blackmail, manipulation)

Relational (ostracising others, spreading rumours, threatening to share personal information

BULLYING MAY ALSO INCLUDE STUDENTS WHO MAY NOT BE DIRECTLY INVOLVED IN BULLYING BUT ARE A BYSTANDER.

2019 Contributions & Charges

Students from Kindergarten – Year 8 will have received student statements outlining contributions and charge requests for this year. Thank you for your patience while options and subject selections were finalised for the middle and upper school students. The early payment discount will be extended until the end of first term.

Thank you for payments received to date, your support is appreciated as the school relies on the collection of contributions and charges to assist in supplying your children with the best possible materials and resources.

In Western Australia the cost of schooling a student in a public school has not increased since 2003.

As approved by the School Board, Morawa DHS asks \$60.00 for students in Kindergarten to Year 6 and \$235.00 for students in Year 7 to 10 for the school year.

Senior School Courses

The School Education Act 1999 states that charges apply to all Year 11& 12 courses and payment is expected. Morawa DHS makes every endeavour to keep course costs to a minimum to ensure maximum participation.

Certificate Courses Studied at WA College of Agriculture – Morawa (WACoAM)

It is wonderful that the school can offer our students a range of work ready Certificate courses that count towards WACE attainment to study through the school campus and offsite at WACoAM. These courses are high cost electives and parents need to be aware that payment is required, in the case where students have elected to study Certificate courses through WACoAM the school is billed by the college for these courses and the school needs to recoup these costs from parents.

School of Isolated and Distance Education (SIDE)

Course fees collected by the school for students enrolled in SIDE subjects are paid directly to SIDE and early payment is

appreciated. The school charges an amenities fee to cover the cost of stationery, photocopying, postage and the provision of technology

Where do contributions and charges go?

The contributions and charges paid by parents and caregivers are budgeted to purchase consumable items used directly by

the students.

Some examples include: ingredients in home economics, printed and electronic materials, photocopying, art materials, timber, metals and consumable tools, consumable sporting equipment and text books.

Who should pay?

Given that all students benefit from the pool of collected fees, it is fair to expect that all parents should pay the balance of contributions and charges. Parents of students who choose the more expensive option subjects need to consider the costs during the subject selection process.

Payment Options

The school understands that the payment of school contributions and charges can be a burden for families. Part payments, early payment discount, deferred payments and credit card debits are all available to support parents experiencing difficulties.

Collecting Contributions & Charges

The school will take a positive approach to collecting contributions from parents and caregivers of students in Years in Kindergarten to Year 10. In particular, the school will highlight the benefits to students if all parents meet their contributions. With respect to charges for Years 7 to 12, the school will actively seek full payment of charges where appropriate.

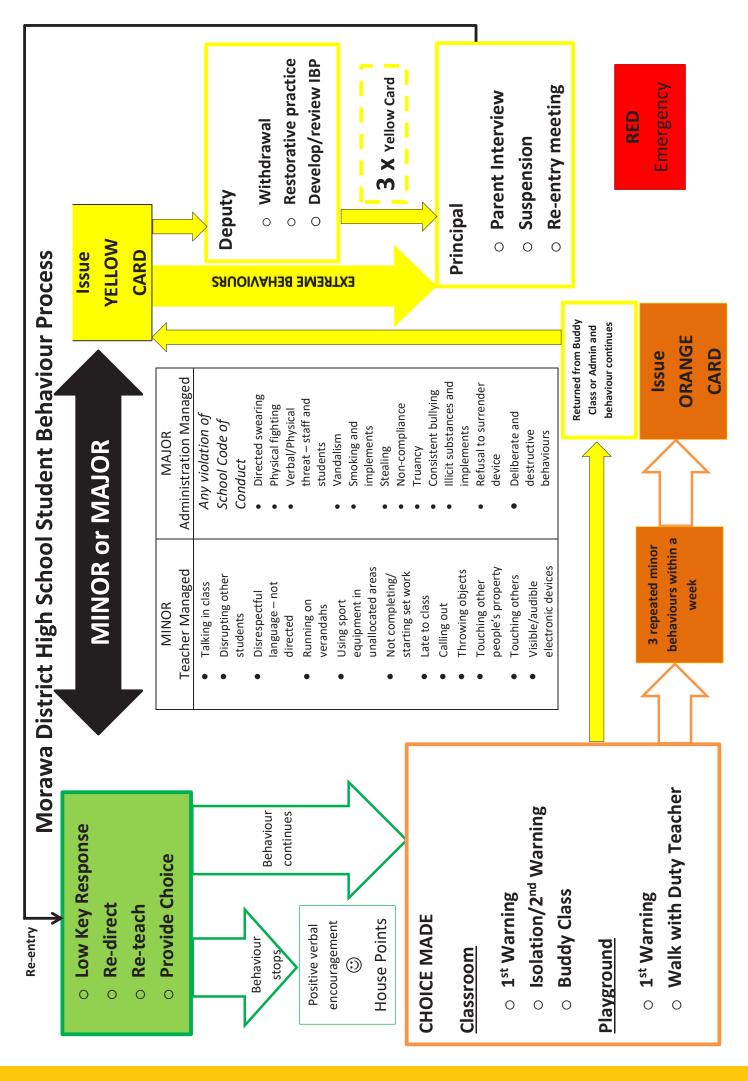












What is **Mentor**?

Help kids develop impulse control

How many of you have been in a situation where, after being on a diet for a few days, a colleague comes to work selling chocolates for a fundraiser? Do you give in and buy a chocolate? It's for a good cause after all. Or do you resist?

Austrian psychologist Walter Mischel conducted an experiment in 1965 involving four-year-olds and marshmallows. Mischel invited individual children into a room where a marshmallow was on the table. The man who brought the child into the room explained that he had to step out for a couple of minutes and if the child wanted to, he or she could eat the marshmallow. However, if the child could wait until the man returned before eating the marshmallow, they would be given an extra marshmallow – so two instead of one. Sure enough, some children couldn't wait and ate the marshmallow before the man returned, while others were able to resist the temptation in order to earn the reward.

Mischel followed the subjects of his experiment into adult life. He discovered that those who had displayed the ability to delay gratification as young children grew to be more socially competent, self-assertive and dependable. And they performed better at school.

Other studies have shown similar results: individuals who had self-control when young later do better on a whole range of variables.

Mischel initially believed that the ability to delay gratification was a result of a certain personality type. However, in a subsequent study with Albert Bandura, Mischel placed children who had not shown the ability to delay gratification in contact with adult role models who demonstrated some delaying tactics. The adults engaged in some kind of self-distracting activity or put their heads down for a nap. The children who observed these adults later showed the ability to delay gratification themselves. That is, they had *learnt* the ability to resist temptation from their experience with the adult role models.

Impulse control is a skill

The implications for parents are clear. If our children display characteristics such as impulsivity, we can help them learn more beneficial ways to deal with the world. Parents can role model the appropriate behaviours and talk to their children about the strategies they used.



Two main factors seem to influence the ability of both children and adults to delay gratification. Both are more likely to delay gratification if they trust they will eventually get the better reward. That is, they will be more inclined to hold out if they believe the person or organisation that is offering the reward is likely to follow through.

Second, people will generally only display delaying behaviours if they have the skills to turn what might be tedious waiting time into a more enjoyable (or at least tolerable) time. In the original experiment, children who delayed eating the marshmallow showed a range of behaviours including turning their chairs away from the table, singing, inventing games with their hands and feet and talking to themselves to help them pass the time.

Emotional intelligence is the key to impulse control

Parents can help younger children delay gratification by distracting them. Many parents find themselves doing this instinctively. When four-year-old Holly nags for snacks just before dinner, they give her a job to do. However, be aware that children younger than about four generally haven't yet developed the parts of the brain that allow them to delay gratification of their own accord.

Older children need to learn how to distract themselves by redirecting their emotions. This is more likely to happen if children understand that emotions don't always need to be acted upon. Older children who are able to focus on the bigger picture will be able make choices that allow them to achieve their goals.

In the book *Influencer*, the authors contend that many social skills, including the ability to delay gratification, can be learnt. This is good news for most of us! They maintain that while we accept that practice improves performance in sport, music and technical areas, few people would think to practice the skills needed to delay gratification, be a better team member or to negotiate with a boss. However the authors say we should. They claim that with the right kind of practice, we can all learn to be more socially competent.
