The Morawa District High School Brass Band was awarded the Len Nisbett Trophy highest aggregate score for country bands and received fantastic positive feedback from the adjudicator during a recent camp to Perth for the Western Australian Band Association State Band Championships.

The band performed extremely well on Saturday 2 June, coming second to La Salle College by 4 points in the Junior Brass Grade.

The band was also acknowledged as the band with the youngest average age and the band which had travelled the furthest to Perth for the championships. It was also acknowledged as the only public school brass band in Western Australia.

Congratulations to our Bandmaster Mrs Helen Walter and the band students on a wonderful achievement.

Special thanks must be given to Mrs Helen Walter for her fabulous work with the band students in instrumental classes and band rehearsals in preparation for the championships and organising and attending the camp.

Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back to school for Term 2. It has been a wonderful start to another successful term and delightful for the community to receive such good welcoming rains.

Morawa District High School is striving to fulfil the vision set out in our Business Plan (2019-2021) of 'Growing Good People'. It is held in high esteem and considered as the region's district high school of choice providing a strong, sustainable education and future for the students, families and communities in the district. Our Business Plan identifies four school priorities:

Staff **professional development** is the focus of our early close sessions at Morawa District High School. Staff have been engaged in a variety of Professional Learning so far this term, with Quality Teaching and Explicit Teaching remaining a focus in 2019. Staff have also attended whole school professional development on Positive Behaviour Support [PBS], Differentiated Learning, Professional Learning Teams, 7 Steps of Writing Success, Integrated Writing, EAL/D Progress Maps and the Aboriginal Cultural Standards Framework.

Term 2 so far has been a busy time full of class assessments, NAPLAN online testing and examinations. Whilst these events play a role, we need to understand that examinations and assessments are only one measure of our children. Students persistently need to strive to achieve their personal best and celebrate themselves as individuals.

Our school has high behaviour expectations and promotes positive behaviour choices at all times. To reward the students who have been demonstrating our Positive Behaviour Support expectations of Respect, Responsibility and Achievement, students will receive Dojo points which will be used to purchase rewards on the PBS Menu.

ANZAC Day

Congratulations to the Morawa District High School and WACOAM Student Councillors who ran the combined ANZAC Day assembly for our school community on Friday 12 April. It was a special ceremony as we remembered all those who have lost their lives in war. This was a very moving ceremony that was well attended by many community members and Organisations. 





Managing your child's anxiety

If your child feels anxious reassure them that these feelings are a normal response to new people, events or potentially challenging situations. Help your child understand that there is a great deal they can do to manage their anxious feelings, so they can get on with the activities they enjoy.

Explain anxiety

If your child is anxious they may struggle to explain how they feel. An important first step in anxiety self-management is explaining to your child how anxiety works.

- Teach your child that the amygdala, the part of the brain that protects them, is always on high alert when they
 are anxious.
- Explain that the amygdala sees danger where there is none, but the body prepares to fight for life or flee from danger as if it's protecting them from a hungry lion.
- Talk about the changes that happen in their body to power them up to fight or flee including; increased heart
 and breathing rates and the pumping of the blood from the stomach to the arms and legs, which can cause
 nausea and even vomiting for some.

Help recognise anxiety-inducing events

Help your child to recognise the specific situations and events that make them feel anxious such as meeting new friends, sitting tests and fear of rejection. In this way you can help your child manage and minimise his feelings of anxiety.

Respond with empathy

When your child feels anxious, the part of the brain that controls rational thinking, decision-making and concentration temporarily goes offline. They can feel easily overwhelmed by simple, everyday events and situations. Rather than protecting your child by allowing them to avoid meeting these challenges, or dismissing them as trivial, validate their feelings with statements such as "I can see you're feeling worried about going to camp without your brother."

Managing anxious moments

Help your child develop the tools to regulate and push their anxious feelings to the background. Practise these anxiety management tools when your child is feeling calm, and it will be easier for them to practise when they are

nervous. These include:

- Taking some deep breaths: Deep belly breathing from the diaphragm calms the amygdala, reducing feelings of anxiousness
- Bringing their attention back to the present: Use their senses to bring their attention to the present moment
 and away from their worries "Tell me five things you see, four things you hear and something you smell"
- Getting them moving: Physical exercise is not only a great distraction but it releases feel-good endorphins that help children and young people feel better and more optimistic about the future
- Defusing their thoughts: Help your child to distance themselves from their thoughts by using distancing statements. Replace "I'm going to fail the test" with "I had a thought that I'm going to fail the test." Rather than changing their thinking, assist your child to distance themselves from unhelpful thoughts

There's a great deal you can do to help your child manage their anxiety. Start by assisting your child to understand the fundamentals of anxiety, show your understanding of their feelings and be ready to support them emotionally to push their anxiety to the background.
